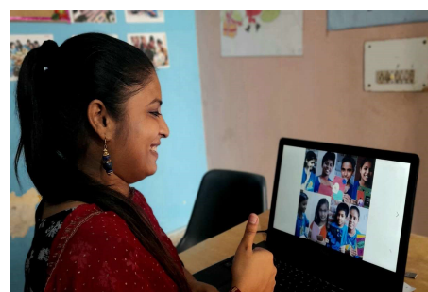
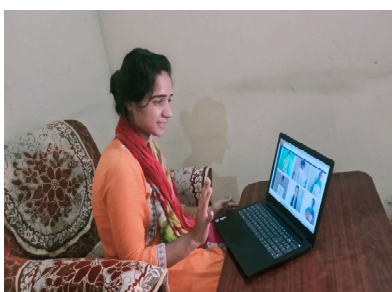

Honouring our mother tongue ... Hindi

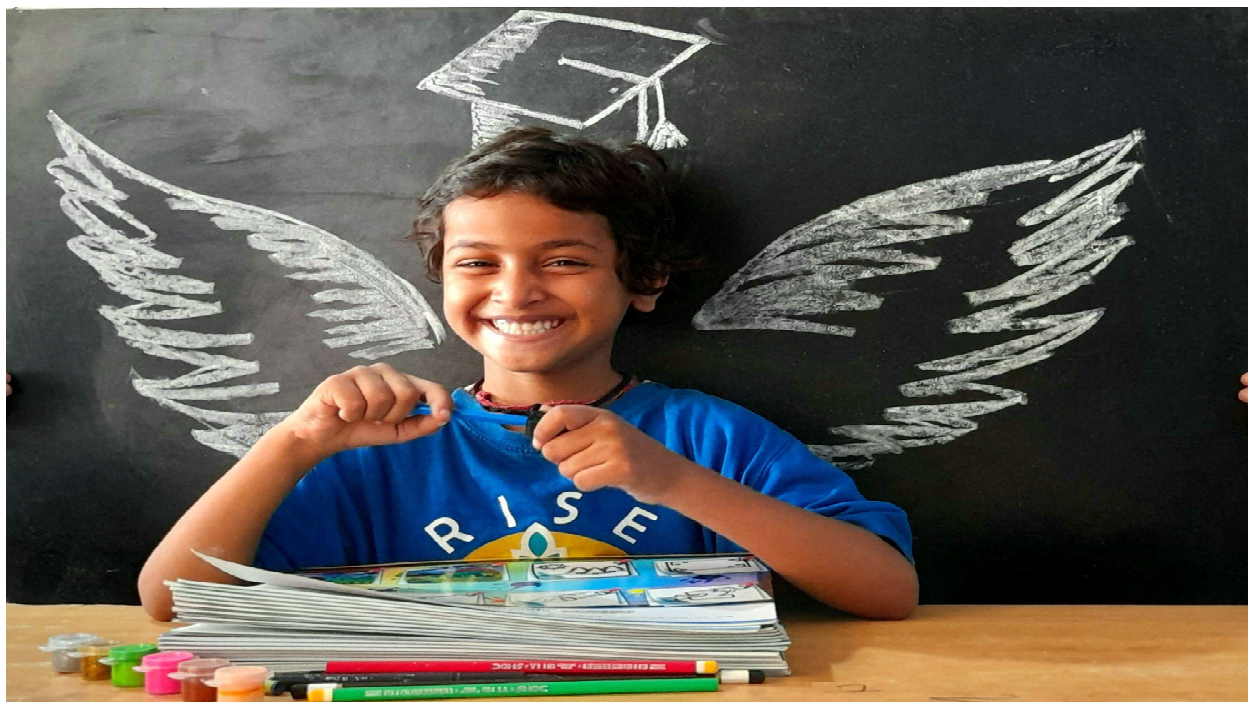

Demonstration of Importance of Education



To remind people of the world the importance of literacy, World Literacy Day is observed every year on September 8. Literacy helps people live with dignity and makes them self-sufficient. This year, Literacy Day assumes even more significance amid the COVID-19 crisis. The mode and focus of learning have changed as virtual classrooms replaced the usual ones and online interactions took the place of face to face discussions. Literacy missions across the world have suffered a setback as reaching out to millions of children in poorer countries have become tough online. International Literacy Day is a United Nations designated day. International Literacy Day (ILD) 2020 will focus on Literacy teaching and learning in the COVID-19 crisis and beyond with a focus on the role of educators and changing pedagogies. The theme will highlight literacy learning in a lifelong learning perspective and therefore mainly focus on youth and adults. The recent Covid-19 crisis has been a stark reminder of the existing gap between policy discourse and reality: a gap that already existed in the pre-Covid-19 era and is negatively affecting the learning of youth and adults who have no or low literacy skills and therefore tend to face multiple disadvantages.

On International Literacy Day our Hon'ble PM Shri Narendra Modi said, *"we promise to work towards achieving 100% literacy by complying with the reforms within the National Education Policy 2020."* RISE believes that a time when we need to reinvent a world of hope, literacy is more important than ever. Literacy plays an important role in empowering and transforming the lives of individuals and society. On International Literacy Day, RISE resolved to create a self-reliant, self-confident and competent Bharat that is literate, educated and empowered. *"Once you learn to read, you will be forever free."* This quote stands completely true as the power to read, or literacy, is much needed to escape any form of bondage or restrictions. History is witness to the fact what a pen or a book could do to overpower even those



who considered themselves undefeatable. On this day RISE Educators shared their feelings regarding the importance of education & told that they feel lucky to be literate persons and that make them feel proud & confident. They can take decisions, understanding the positive and negative sides of the issues/ topics. Educators shared that they feel privileged and honoured as they can share their education to others who can use education as weapon to conquer the world and could set examples for other ones. Educators also told the students that Literacy is essential to get free from the shackles of poverty, exploitation, taboos, superstitions, stereotypes, hegemonies, and anything that holds back the society from progressing. Children very carefully learnt everything by their teachers through virtual classes and promised their teachers to study regularly.



Menstrual Hygiene Day



While menstruation is a normal phenomenon, which is an essential feature of a woman's reproductive ability, yet girls and women in India go through extreme struggles to manage their menstruation cycle every month. India, a sub-continent with over 1,380,209,695 people as per July 6, 2020, has **only 57.6% of women using sanitary napkins during their menses**. If this percentage wasn't already a red flag about the rest of **42.4% of the women across the country resorting to unhygienic practices** like using cloth, cotton, leaves, ash, or hay, the recent Corona lockdown created harsh circumstances for menstruating women. Use of Ashes and Muds for menstrual hygiene, washing reusable feminine products with soap and drying them in sunlight may be difficult due to lack of water, private facilities, and cultural taboos associated with menstruation can increase a woman's chances of contracting cervical cancer, Reproductive Tract Infections, Hepatitis B infection, various types of yeast infections and Urinary Tract Infection, to name a few. The situation is worst in poor and marginalised segments.

In times of Covid pandemic, where health and hygiene is of utmost im-

portance, lack of menstrual hygiene is only aggravating their risk to infection. AROH on personal level took the initiative of sanitary napkin distribution to women in need. Along with the distribution of the pads, AROH-RISE conducted community surveys, extensive online webinars and Facebook Live sessions to connect with the last mile houses in the villages and make them aware about safe menstruating practices. Experts were roped in, projectors were used and local ANMs were engaged to achieve the mission of "Period Freedom" – effort for Promoting Freedom of Women from Period Pain and Shame. RISE Educators recalled how helpless the women had become during COVID and how the personal hygiene had taken a back seat. While RISE teams were on the ground, trying to facilitate essential supplies people in need, they met residents of Sangam Vihar & Mundka slums of Delhi. The residents said, *"We don't even have enough to afford two square meal for our families how can then we ask our husbands for sanitary napkins? We & our daughters have managed to survive our cycles while using old clothes. We know*

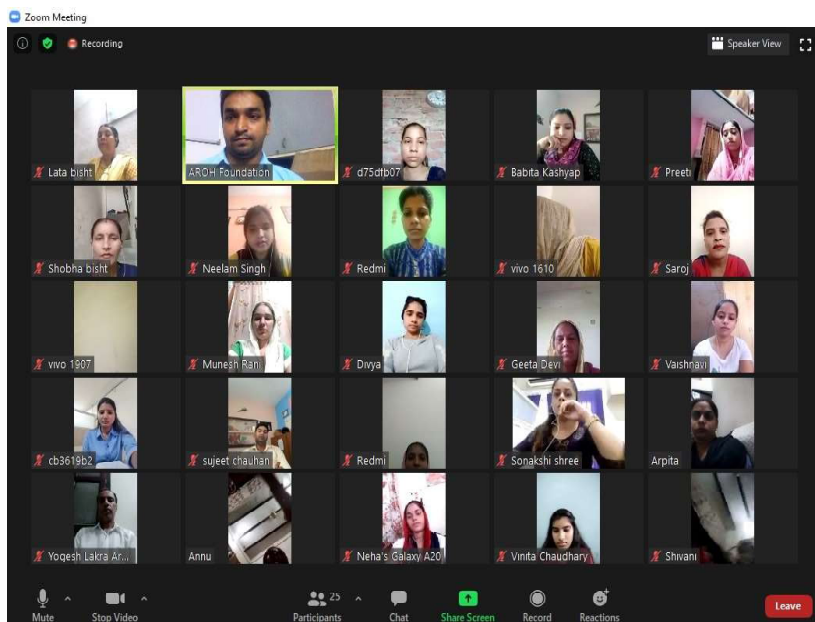
it can affect our health but then what can we do?"

During the survey our teams observed Rohini wasn't alone. Hundreds of women in the urban slums of Delhi were in a similar situation and things may be worse than what they appear as such issues are not discussed openly. They already were struggling to survive in lockdown as the pandemic had already taken their sources of income.

With more and more awareness, we need to address both the genders so that we make them comfortable and accept menstruation as a naturally occurring healthy phenomenon, instead of some shameful and impure occurrence that makes women untouchable for the time being. Further, we need to take the initiative of making sure that women coming from less fortunate families have access to sanitary napkins, while the state-run schools come back in action after the pandemic is taken care of.



Online Educator Workshop



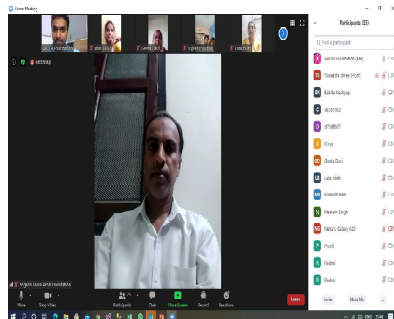
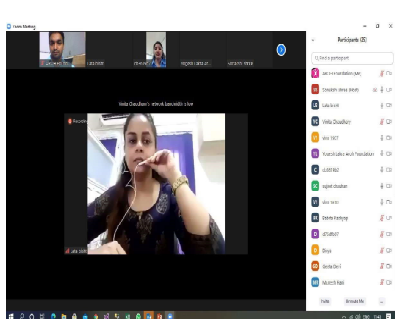

Every aspect of online teaching was touched upon with an effective group task given by the AROH Head office staff followed by a fruitful discussion.

The workshop was summed up the workshop by giving very important suggestions to the teachers such as using new techniques to build students' self-confidence; giving students ample of opportunity to engage in studies & activities at home; simple conversation, discussion and debates during Zoom/ Whatsapp class interactions and finally, attending workshops for professional growth. This workshop was a medium for all the RISE Educators to encourage & to participate freely and frankly so as to provide relevant and useful insights for the smooth functioning of work & responsibilities.

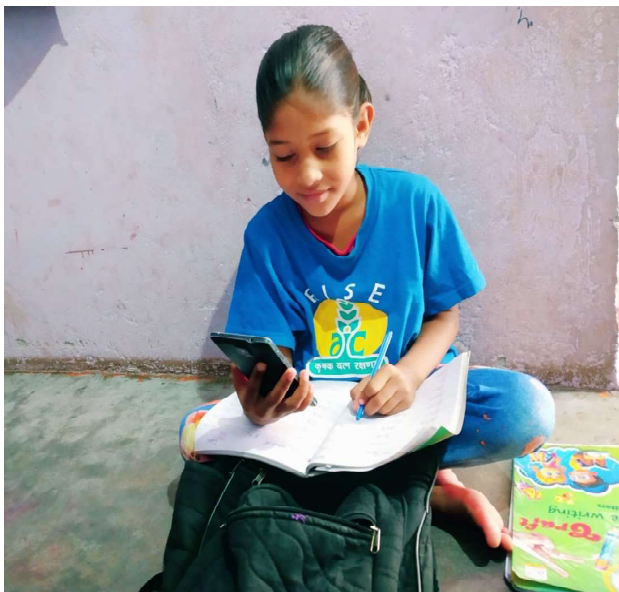

Anshika, 11 years, is a fruit of hard work put up by RISE educators, and her parents. She is a student in 5th standard in Delhi government school. But at this stage also she was not able to hold pencil properly and identification of simple alphabet was a struggle for her. But Anshika's mother Meera Devi always wanted her daughter to study & she saw education as a hope towards better life. During one of our RISE awareness campaign, Meera Devi came to know about RISE initiative in her region. It took her no time to get Anshika enrolled for the benefits. Anshika has been a regular student since start of RISE in 2016 and now after around 1.5 years, her growth is spectacular. But in times of COVID-19, studies of Anshika were badly hit as the classes were shifted to online mode. Coming from a poor background fighting for meal and money, extra support for better education was not even in thoughts. But Aoli Singh, RISE Educator didn't let her suffer. She informed AROH team about Anshika's condition and on the very next day Anshika's father's smartphone was recharged with Internet so that she can continue her digital classes. Now Anshika is happily continuing her classes.



In her own words, Anshika's mother Meera Devi proudly says, *"Hard work put in by her educator, regular monitoring and her own dedication has made her score well both scholastically and CCA too."*

RISE has given her hope to study & see dreams for her bright future. Anshika has been very happy and she promised us saying, *"I'm so grateful that my studies has not stopped and this all because of my RISE teacher and AROH. I'll pay much more attention towards my studies and will score number 1 position in examinations."*
